





The Witness Stand

The green flag drops

fter months of planning and talking, it's time for me to put up or shut up. Deadline has passed, and I'm getting ready to push this issue out the door.

So far, things seem to have gone better than I expected. Most contributors got the word about the earlier deadlines, and I am grateful for their timely submissions.

Getting an early start helped immensely. I began working on the format changes about two months ago, and I was able to lay out the concours article a couple of weeks before deadline. Without that head start, I don't see how I could have made it.

Incidentally, although the tenth of the month may sound like an early deadline, that leaves me only seven days to do all the editing and layout, and even less if we want to get a near-final version out for proofreading. The rest of the time is needed by the printer, the mailing house, and the Postal Service.

Overall, I'm pleased with the way things turned out. The biggest substantive change is the introduction of the Event Capsules, which appear on pages 9–11. Once you get used to using these, I think you'll find them a convenient reference, and we'll have much less need to thumb around looking for individual event flyers.

Most of the other changes are cosmetic. We have a new style


for section headings. These look especially good in color, so check out the full-color PDF version that's available on our web site. We also have a new banner (the logo that appears at the top of page 1), which we'll be using on the covers, too, starting in January.

We can't change the cover sooner because the November and December covers were printed before I came on board. To keep the costs down, we preprint three months of covers at a time. That's also why Greg is still listed as editor on the back cover.

Speaking of covers, you may have noticed that the past two have listed SDR as "2006 Region of the Year." We received that award at Parade, based on the club's activities in 2006. However, technically we should refer to it as the 2007 award; Northern New Jersey Region won the 2006 award. For the reasons I just outlined, we won't be able to fix this until January.

If you read *Christophorus* magazine, you probably saw the very complimentary write-up of our recent Parade, and the wonderful tribute to our Grand Marshals, Ginny and Jack Case, who will appear on next month's *Witness* cover. I especially enjoyed the photos of the Cases in their salad days. Thanks to Tom Golich for sending me copies of those articles.

While browsing the club's web site recently, I came across a



link for "sample digital photos" from the Driving Instructor National Certification Event. Some of the images are spectacular. I contacted the digital artist, Gary Brown, who agreed to create portraits for the president's and editor's columns. You can see the car photos on our site, and then check out more of his work at www.digitalfotoart.biz. Thanks, Gary.

Speaking of thanks, I cannot close this column without expressing my gratitude to Greg for his years of tireless work on the Windblown Witness, and for his assistance in making the editorial transition as smooth as possible. I am especially grateful that Greg has agreed to continue providing his bountiful stream of photographs, along with his articles on autocross and time trial events. We all are indebted to him for his service.

Details: An autocross is a fun, competitive event, normally held on a large parking lot such as the ones at Qualcomm. Traffic cones are used to define a twisty course, which drivers attempt to navigate—one at a time—as quickly as possible.

Participants should arrive early with a full tank of gas. Remove anything that's loose from the car's interior, then head for the safety inspection. You'll need only your car's normal equipment (seat belts, etc.), plus a helmet that meets Snell 2000 safety stan-

dards or better. The club offers helmets for rent.

Inexperienced autocrossers will be provided with instructors at no additional cost. Cars must be empty and ready to go before entering the Tech Inspection line. Cars arriving in line after 7:30 are subject to \$10 late fee; no cars admitted after 8:00.

Details: A time trial is a competitive drivingeducation event, often run on major race tracks. During practice runs, multiple cars are on the course simultaneously, running continuous laps. Passing is expected and required. Although this is a competitive event against the clock, it is not wheelto-wheel racing.

Saturday's program will comprise practice runs. Sunday will provide practice runs in the morning and timed runs later in the afternoon.

Although instructors are available to assist new student drivers, Time Trials are not entry-level activities. Participation is limited to licensed participants or students, who must have completed at least six autocrosses, or four autocrosses and a drivers school.

Safety equipment requirements are more stringent than for autocross. See the SDR and Zone 8 web sites for details on equipment and car preparation.

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Monthly Meeting

The following highlights are adapted from formal meeting minutes prepared by Secretary Tami Ibbetson. Members who wish to obtain a copy of the full minutes should send e-mail to SECRETARY@PCASDR.ORG.

The October 3 meeting of the Board of Directors was held at the San Diego Automotive Museum. All Board members were present. Minutes of the September meeting were approved.

Treasurer's Report

The Money Market and checking accounts both reconciled.

The 50th Anniversary team posted their income from sales of seat-belt purses and decals.

A check for \$1,000 was sent to the Braille Institute as a charitable donation from the "PORSH-uh" T-shirt sales.

The Driving Instructor National Certification Event was a huge success, attended by about 50 instructors. The Board thanked Dave Gardner and Keith Verlaque for their work on this event.

President's Report

Ted congratulated Jennifer Re-

inhardt, Kim Crosser, and Dave Gardner on their election to the 2008 Board, and thanked Ruth Young, Katina Gonzalez, and Leslie Shirley for participating in the election process.

A total of 122 ballots were cast, including 15 who requested ballots by mail. Two returned ballots were illegible. However, the results were not so close that

the illegible ones would affect the outcome. Based on this, Ted concluded:

- The method of voting does not affect voter participation.
- No one voiced objection to having to put a name or member number on the ballot. (Arizona Region uses a similar voting method in their newsletter.)
- We should conduct a "dry run" before going live with the electronic process.
- We should not use shaded backgrounds on ballots because some fax machines cannot reproduce shaded text clearly.
- Only two members reported delays in receiving mailed ballots.
- We spent \$65 on this year's election, as opposed to more than \$3,000 in recent years.

Ted reminded committee chairs that the event calendar is set by the President with approval of the Board. He specifically asked everyone not to plan events for January 12 (50th Anniversary) or February 9 (Driver Dinner).

We may have an early start for

autocrosses this year, as the Chargers hopes of a playoff berth seem to be diminishing.

Ted announced that he had invited Kathy and Roger Penske to our 50th Anniversary Celebration. Unfortunately, Roger has a conflict relating to the Detroit Auto Show.

Chair Reports

Social. The budget reconciliation for the Progressive Dinner will be presented at the next meeting. The Mystery Weekend, originally scheduled for October 20–21, was canceled due to lack of interest.

Zone 8 Speed Festival. The Club received a check for \$4,477 as our portion of the proceeds from the Zone 8 Speed Festival, based on the number of hours contributed by SDR members.

50th Anniversary Committee. The

committee is working on the flyer and invitations. Attendees will receive wine glasses, sponsored by Black Forest. We have a guaranteed commitment to the Hotel del Coronado of \$15,000, and \$5,000 for entertainment.

After considering various pricing structures, the Board voted to charge \$50 per person for early


Monthly Meetings

Honoring a promise of lifetime membership for Jimmy Douthit, the Board voted to renew his PCA membership for another three years.


Adjournment/Next Meeting





Reminiscing with Jack and Ginny Case

In writing these 50th Anniversary articles for the Witness this year, I have had a lot of members tell me how much they really enjoy them. One couple who always have some input for me are Jack and Ginny Case. They wrote down some thoughts on their early days in the club and sent them to me, so I thought I would share them with you.

But first, here's just a little background on Jack and Ginny. They are Charter Members of PCA. Think about that. They were at the start of it all! At that time, most people you might run into thought that these little cars were some sort of VW.

So now, let me share what they wrote to me.

We arrived in Los Angeles in 1957. We felt lost. There wasn't a PCA Region in all of Los Angeles except for the "Porsche Owners Club." We heard that San Diego Region was just getting started, and one of the members, Paul Madigan, contacted us to go on a trip to Mexico with the San Diego group. [San Diego Region was chartered at the end of 1957.—JS] We had previously corresponded with him, as he was interested in starting a PCA Region. That trip was to Rosarita Beach. We met some wonderful people and had such a great time. One of the couples we met were Keith and Lorraine Ewton, who would often invite us down to San Diego to stay with them and participate in the Region events.

This was an exciting time for San Diego, as they were getting ready to obtain their charter from National. Jack was the Executive Vice President and the West Coast Coordinator. The President of PCA, Bill Sholar, had asked Jack to present the charter to the Region. [That was done in the early part of 1958. However, the Charter is dated 1957.—JS]

We went to all the Porsche Parades in San Diego: 1977, 1992, and 2007, and we enjoyed them all. I also want to mention Bea Cole, who was a wonderful person. Her history in the San Diego Region was outstanding.

In reading the articles by John Straub, we have found them very interesting and informative. They have brought back many fond memories and reminded us how often we had become a part of San Diego Region, even though we were living in Los Angeles.

We are looking forward to the 50th Anniversary of the San Diego Region, just as we attended the 25-year celebration. It does not seem possible that 50 years have gone by, the club is even more active, and we have found more wonderful friends. We are looking forward to a wonderful 50th Installation Dinner.

Jack and Ginny are true treasures of our Region, when you see them at an event please go up and say hi....they still to this day have that same enthusiasm for our Region that they had 50 years ago!

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The Way We Were

1981 autocrosses had tailgate parties

ere we are, celebrating the 50th year of San Diego Region. When I left off my tour through the club's history, we were in the middle of 1981, a special year because we were coming up on our twenty-fifth anniversary year.

In July of that year, we held an autocross on the east side of the stadium. This one included a tailgate party with food after the event. (At that time we had only 15 classes, and each of our autocross events had a sponsor to keep the cost to the members low.) Some of the members running the autocross were John Shirk, Neal Appel, Jim Dowell, Dave Belanich, Jerry Sturm, Margie Smith-Haas, Paul Haas, Tom Hauseur, Jr., Joe Weber, and Bruce Osterberg.

Also in July, we had our annual Progressive Dinner, chaired by Margie Smith-Haas and Art and Gerry Wrightson. Art had been President in 1979, and was one of those guys who was always there to work for the club, chairing everything from rallies to social events. Although he is no longer with us on earth, even to this day I think about him and what a benefit to the club it would be if he were still here. Well, back to the event. We began at Steve and Linda Dockstader's for *hors d'oeuvres*, then to Tom and Nat Hauseur's house for salad, and finally to Nancy Hoover's house for sirloin steaks. The dinner was sold out, with a hundred members attending.

August led off with another Autocross, this time with a barbeque. We were trying to make our autocrosses more social for members, not just running cars, which really helped improve the camaraderie among members. Also that month, Gil Klecan chaired a tour to the Monterey Historic Races. To end the month, we held a swap meet at Mesa Porsche-Audi in La Mesa (where Carl Burger Dodge is now).

In September we held a "New Members Get-Ac-

quainted Potluck," at a cost of \$3 per couple to cover beer and wine. We did these dinners for several years for the members.

At the end of September I chaired an "Observation Tour/Fun Rally," which cost \$5 per car. About 35 cars ran it. I remember that John and Carol Shirk brought their one-week-old daughter, Myste, on the tour. She sat on the floor of their 914. (What car seat?) I think that is still a record. Oh, and they took first!

October began with our concours at Fashion Valley, chaired by Ernie Paschoal and Pat Scanlan. Next up was Holtville for our Drivers' Education and Time Trial, chaired by Dick Eimers, Joe Weber and Ed Eastridge. The cost was \$30 for two days of driving, thanks to sponsorship by Dave Naples Porsche Care. Some of the members running included Bill Shaffer (one of our charter members 25 years earlier), Carol Muir (who became our third woman President few years later), Nils Hallstrom, Keith Nelson, Joe Weber, Ron Stark, Richard Wozniak, Darlene Osterberg, Jerry Beauchane, and Nancy Faulkner.

In November we held our annual "Turkey Tear Grand Prix" at Malibu Grand Prix, where Don Clark streaked across the finish in first place. This was also a charity event. The cost was \$1 plus two cans of food per adult. The winners won turkeys for Thanksgiving. Once again, to keep the cost down and to be able to donate, we had a sponsor, Jack Harman of Carrera Sport.

To end the year, Art Wrightson chaired a tour to see the auto collection at the Tower of Beauty in San Sylmar. [That's right across the street from where the Nethercutt Museum is now housed.—Ed.]

That was it for 1981. The next year was to be a big one, our twenty-fifth anniversary. We'll look at that next month.



Why put off what you'll never stop wanting?





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Driving instructors receive national certification

ayback! The word has a nice ring to it, especially when you are the one on the receiving end.

San Diego Region driving instructors gathered at Qualcomm Stadium on a beautiful September day for a special event. All were to share a unique experience in continuing education and, along with it, a great day of driving, camaraderie, and mentoring. At the end of the day, they could receive National Driver's **Education Instructor certification** as a payback for the work they do at every driving event instructing students.

Pete Tremper, National Drivers Education Chair, arrived at Qualcomm Stadium to lead the day's instruction. His intelligent (he holds a Ph.D. in Chemistry), low-keyed, professional manner was a perfect fit for the classroom instruction and driving sessions.

After introductions by SDR

Chief Driving Instruc-Keith Verlaque, Pete began the first of several classroom sessions. He emphasized that there are a number of basic issues that national level instructors must embrace. To improve our instruction, we must foster a positive attitude in our students and ourselves, and we must be constantly aware of safety issues. Although we are considered amateurs, we mustuse professionalism in all our dealings at the track. The use of discretion in dis-

cussing people is critical, as well as cooperating with colleagues in solving issues that come up at the

keep current on new teaching techniques and philosophies. Instructors must keep current on new cars and their characteristics, so that we can effectively students who drive them. We also found that peer mentoring is a very valuable tool. It is important to take advantage of the talent and knowledge of

other instructors. Mentoring is an important paradigm change that can have lasting effects on our work together.

Three-minute interview

The first job of an instructor when assigned a student is to conduct what is called the "Three-Minute Interview." This purposeful meeting is the most effective way for an instructor to gain information about the student and their car. The instructor should ask pointed questions, get the student to talk about himself/ herself, and develop a comfortable working relationship with the student.

It is important to gain insight into the student's attitude, their motives for participating in the event, their capabilities, and how

well prepared they are for the day's driving. Formalized, the process is Social, Technical, Safety, and Directive.

Social questions are asked to find out about the student and their background, such as finding out about the person, how long they have been driving the car, how are they feeling, etc. For example, if a student is a skier, they will have some understanding of apexes.

Then the instructor would ask technical questions, such as what kind of tires are on the car? Do you work on your car? What high-speed driving experience do you have?

Safety-related questions are of critical importance. The instructor determines how familiar the student is with passing zones, what the different flags mean, corner working, and emergency procedures.

The Directive art of the interview sets the tone for the instructional process and establishes how the instructor and student communicate the verbal and hand gestures that mean brake, shift, apex, track out, etc.

By conducting the "Three-Minute Interview," goals for the driving session can be established. Depending on the student's experience, the initial instruction might be focused on seeing the flag stations and being smooth, or for students with some experience but new to the track, instruction might be focused on line and braking.

It is important to ask if the student has questions. These help the instructor determine where to focus instruction.

Pairing off

CDIs Keith Verlaque and David Gardner did an excellent job of pairing instructors. One instructor was to act as a student and the other as the instructor, implementing the lessons presented in the classroom sessions.

I was fortunate to draw Martha McGowan as my partner for the day. Martha acted as

the student during the first driving session, and I played the role of instructor. Although Martha is a friend and, I have served on the PCA-SDR Board with her for two years, worked with her on many club activities, and competed with her in the JP class, the "Three-Minute Interview" process enabled me to gain even more respect for her as I learned about her background, her car, and her driving experience. I quickly saw how valuable the "Three-Minute Interview" process could be.

After a run session, we then switched roles and drove another session. Both of us gained a better understanding of the process, how to effectively deliver instruction to adult learners, and the value of mentoring, as well as learning techniques on how to be a better driver. This mentoring produced a wonderful camaraderie among the class as well, and everyone felt encouraged to share ideas about instructing, driving, and the track with one another.

Teaching adults

The next classroom session dealt with "How to Teach Adult Learners." Topics covered were "Thorndike's Laws of Learning" and the "Four-Step Learning Process": have an experience; reflect on the experience; develop ideas and conclusions; and test the conclusions. Also discussed were the

normal learning curve (rapid early improvement, plateau, and regression), learning styles (student learns by doing/student learns by thinking and understanding/student learns by experiencing the process/student learns by watching and listening). Barriers to learning, such as fear, self-concept, defense mechanisms, stress and anxiety, and impatience and overconfidence were discussed in detail.

Methods and Skills of the successful instructor include teaching "Vision." This is the instructor's most important tool. Continually looking ahead and driving smoothly, rather than driving from apex cone to apex cone, will enable a person to drive any track. At 100 mph your car covers 150 feet of ground every second, 300 feet every two seconds, and 450 feet every three seconds. Looking ahead is a must for both successful track and street driving.

The next thing a successful instructor does is to conduct a demonstration drive so the student can see, hear, and feel what the car can do. The demonstration drive must be done without scaring the student, though.

Another area an effective instructor must be good at is communication. The instructor knows that communication is a two-way street. The instructor must teach, ask questions of the student to be sure the student understands the concepts being taught, and be ready to respond to the student's questions.

Methods of communication include verbal and non-verbal, such as hand signals. You should determine how to communicate with the student during the "Three-Minute Interview."

A successful instructor uses praise to give the student confidence. It is important to know the student's comfort zone. Look at body language. Is the student pushing on an invisible brake pedal? Does he/she have a white knuckled grip on a part of the car?

Back to the track

We put these concepts into practice during another driving session. The instructor performed the "Three-Minute Interview,"

discussed "staging," did two-lap the demonstration drive. pulled then into the pits to have the "student" drive. Through the process each of us gained con-

fidence in the use of the teaching process, and our driving became smoother and faster.

The third classroom session continued instruction of "What to Teach." Focus was on the different teaching techniques for the novice and the beginner. Then there was a third driving session, followed by a final classroom session on Debriefing and Critiquing, and a written final exam.

I won't give away all of the in-

struction. There was a lot more to the day. I hope that those instructors who missed this exceptionally valuable day will be able to participate in a National DE Instructor School in the future. The feeling was that the training we received, the day's terrific driving (it was a blast!), the mentoring and camaraderie we experienced, along with National Driver Education Instructor certification, were excellent payback.

The session featured a technical presentation on the Yokohama Advan tires, a new premier line of high-performance tires. Advan tires are intended for high-performance cars and sport SUVs.

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

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


New book recalls raceways of yore

evisit the "asphalt playgrounds of bygone eras" in Pete Hylton's *Ghost Tracks*, set for release on October 15. In his second book, the SCCA historian takes "then-and-now" looks at some of sports car racing's greatest tracks.

Ghost Tracks is Hylton's testament to the enduring impact these sites have had on the history of sports car racing. "The progression from street circuits, to airport circuits, to early permanent facilities, to the current generation of tracks has been amazing," he said. "It is part of what has shaped our sport."



In *Ghost Tracks*, Hylton describes the tracks as "echoing with the roar of engines and the squeal of skinny bias-ply tires. The paddocks were filled with gentleman racers tinkering on Ferraris, OSCAs, bathtub Porsches, and Coopers. Now, they sit silent and the engines scream only in memories."

Hylton has first-hand knowledge of the subject. In the 1980s, he raced at Mid-America Raceway, one of the tracks profiled in the book. He joined the SCCA as a high-school student in 1973 and competed for 25 years. He served on the SCCA board of directors for nine years, and holds the honor of being the youngest-ever elected member of that body. In January 2007, he received the SCCA's highest honor, the Woolf Barnato Award, for his service to the organization.

After retiring from his position on the board, he volunteered to become historian and archivist for the world's largest active motor sports membership organization. Hylton also became a contributing writer for *SportsCar*, the SCCA's official magazine. *Ghost Tracks* is based on the series of the same name that he published between 2001 and 2007. His first book was a history of the SCCA in commemoration of the organization's 60th anniversary.



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
