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


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
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From the Co-driver's Seat

Do you vacation with your Porsche?

For years, my Summer vacation was spent at the annual PCA Porsche Parade, which is Porsche Club of America's annual convention. Held in a different part of the country every year, it is an opportunity to spend a week driving your Porsche, learning about Porsche, socializing about Porsche, and well, just spending a week doing things Porsche with great people from around the country (and the world).

Besides being a Porsche event, the appeal to me was that it was in a different location every year, getting me to travel to parts of the country I probably never would have gone before. Of the 25 or so I've attended, I've driven to at least 20 of them, having to fly to the others, usually due to time restraints of cross-country driving.

This year's Parade is at Lake of the Ozarks in Missouri. which was also the site of the 1983 Porsche Parade. I made that drive in 83, a long 2-day drive halfway across the country, in a borrowed Porsche. Yes, borrowed. The original plan was to drive my 356 to the event. The car and I were ready to go, when just a couple days before the planned date to leave, the 356 dropped a valve seat and quickly dismissed itself from a possible crosscountry adventure. After realizing the car would not get back together in time, I had to face the fact that I would not be driving. Then I got a call the next day from some friends who had heard about my dilemma, and they said they were about to go on an overseas vacation for a few weeks, and why not take their 911 to the Parade. Really? A casual agreement was made (you break it, you fix-it, have a good time) and we were off.

Of course, with driving on a long trip, there is always the

possibility of breakdowns. A good, thorough check of the car before you leave is a must. On the older cars there is always a list of spare parts and extra tools you should carry in the trunk, clutch cables, relays, ignition parts, belts, assorted wrenches and such. The newer cars just need a good check beforehand, as there just aren't as many things that would go wrong with the modern cars that would be easily serviceable.

Of the Parades I've driven to, I would have to say half of them involved some sort of mishap, or failure, along the way. Voltage regulators, broken clutch fork, throttle rod, vapor lock, stuck throttle linkage, cold start valve, loose wiring, tire issues, hitting road debris, etc. Once we drove the 911 from Oklahoma to California without the use of the clutch. How resourceful can you be when you need to? One great benefit was, when you are at a Porsche Parade, there is always someone around who is willing to help fix your Porsche.

One thing I always carried was a copy of Panorama magazine, because the contacts for local regions in PCA are listed in it. This has come in handy a couple of times. A quick phone call, or a check of the local region's website, can usually put you in touch with someone who can help you find local help—another great benefit of PCA.

So whether you are driving that new Macan, or that 60-year old 356, make sure your car is ready for the long trip, and then enjoy that freedom of driving. Watch that scenery change every hour. Realize what a big and beautiful country this is.

Enjoy the drive.



The Birth of a New Region

In the mountains of Northern Arizona, a brand new PCA region has emerged to better serve members in the vast and sparsely populated northern half of Arizona. Arizona already had two established PCA regions. The AZPCA originally included the entire state. Today they have 1092 Primary and 636 Affiliate members. Primarily because of the distance between Tucson and other communities in the far southern portion of the state, the Southern Arizona Region (SAR) was split off to better serve those areas. Today, SAR has 295 Primary members and 210 Affiliate members. It's been 51 years since the SAR was established (1967). The new Mountain Region will now cover more than half of northern Arizona and becomes the newest PCA region in America.

The Arizona Mountain Region (AZM) is larger geographically than the other two Arizona regions put together. The distance between, what they now refer to as their "Chapter Communities" is diverse. Initially structured to serve the Prescott (Tri-City Chapter), Sedona (Verde Valley Chapter), Lake Havasu (River Chapter) and the (Flagstaff Chapter), the Mountain Region includes the entire Northern Arizona Porsche community. The territory covered by the AZPCA and the SAR Regions share an estimated seven million or more people. The AZM is estimated to have only 6-700 thousand, with Porsche owners spread all across the region's area. It has been necessary for PCA members in the north to drive the 220 to 500 miles (round trip) to participate in PCA meetings or other club activities. The bond between like-minded friends, great relationships, and mutual passions for the margue are well established in northern Arizona. The two existing PCA Regions in Arizona were very supportive and helpful while this new region was being formed. The Zone 8 group of 13 Regions came together at the President's Meeting in Palm Springs this past January. Support was overwhelming. AZMR is now number 14. Support and helpful guidance from David Witteried (Zone 8 Rep) and several people at PCA National was truly inspirational. It certainly wasn't easy to pull the application and bylaws together. The National PCA and the AZM Organizing Team worked together and made it possible to establish the new AZM region.

Format:

They are working to include every PCA member in each of the Chapter communities where clusters of PCA members (and non-PCA Porsche owners) are concentrated.

Each of the four Chapters will have a local Leader (AZM Board member) to coordinate regional as well as local activities. The Leaders will help to gather up existing PCA members and attract new PCA members. The key for serving the four geographically diverse Chapters is to keep them involved in regional and local activities. AZ Mountain Region includes everyone and will serve them with positive support. Membership meetings, as well as Board meetings, will move around the region on a regular basis.

The Team:

The startup began when Don E. (Donny) Blackburn started the ball rolling to organize a new region for Northern Arizona. He made sure to carefully select and gather an exceptional Team to make it happen. Donny is the AZM Region founding President and designer of the region's new logo badge. The Team includes two Past PCA Presidents, Phil Mullen (Kansas City Region President 1969), Bob Frith (AZPCA President 1998 and 1999). PCA leaders like Steve Sweet (formally with Grand Prix Region) will be founding Vice President, Steve Beer (Former Bend, Oregon Region Treasurer) is Secretary, and Maynard Goff is Treasurer. Each Chapter also has an AZM PCA Leader, who also holds a voting board seat.

The region started with a list of more than 150 existing PCA members that were known to reside in the AZM region. They also expect to draw in 20-30 additional non-PCA Porsche owners in the first year.

Initial Goals:

In the first year, the AZM region is focusing on membership and Chapter leadership. The New AZM Region is making an effort to post a Website to help gather up their "geographically diverse constituency." Multi-Regional invitational events, social tours between Chapters and other Regions in Zone 8 are on the proposed schedule.

To discourage the possible negative effects of "cliques," this region is determined to be an outgoing, friendly and welcoming group of marque enthusiasts. This was mentioned several times in the initial exploratory meetings with potential chapter community PCA members.

Hospitality and generous friendships are the Arizona Mountain Region's promise to all PCA members and all Regions.

Northern Arizona is a Mecca for beautiful mountains, lush forests, scenic deserts, red rock wonders, the Grand Canyon, Canyon de Chelly, Petrified Forest, and Lake Powell. The smaller communities in the AZM region offer local art, interesting shops and really nice people! And... don't forget northern Arizona has some of the best driving experiences in America—roads and byways to please any Porsche driver. Contact information will be posted soon. The AZM's door is open to welcome new and transferring


PCA members as well as visitors from any other PCA region.



The View from the Back: 4 Corners Tour

Usually this column covers the times, participants and results of multi-lap events held on temporary or permanent race tracks. This month I am featuring a one lap event held on public roads covering 2068 miles, six states and a time span of 9 days! This was the third spring tour planned by Victoria and Javier Varon and, from our perspective, the most enjoyable.

We met at Hoehn Porsche on Saturday, April 7, put 4 Corners decals on our cars, collected our goodie bags, had a safety discussion led by president Tom Gould, and started our 394 mile journey to Scottsdale, AZ. Our line of 21 cars was soon split into several sub-groups and we regrouped at our first stop in Coachella. Here we were joined by Mark and Karen Wooldridge from Manhattan Beach. After "filling our car tanks and emptying our personal tanks," according to an unnamed pundit, we headed for Quartzite, AZ, for lunch.

Quartzite is the gem and mineral capital of the southwest. Each winter they have at least 10 shows attracting rock hounds from around the world. By April the stores were still open, but the snowbirds and rock hounds had departed, leaving a very quiet little town. Most of us had a fast food lunch and left for the Scottsdale Marriott Suites in Old Town. After checking in to our very nice rooms, we had a few hours to rest before a heavy appetizer, beer, and wine mixer at a nearby restaurant. Kathy and I were joined by Ann Archibald and Gisele Gonzalez, the only two people that were driving this tour solo. In the Baja 1000 and other off road races, drivers who do the whole trip solo are called Ironmen. Since Gisele has done all three tours solo we have dubbed her "Iron-woman." We also met Laura Manz, an electrical engineer, who was traveling in a 2-car group including her brother, Rich, Bryan Poffenberger, and Kristy DeBias. We also spent time with Mark and Karen and Dr. Allan and Carolyn Rosenberg, PCA members from Orange County, who had been on previous tours. The steak tartare was my favorite appetizer!

At 9:30 Sunday morning we started the longest leg of the tour—415 miles to Albuquerque. We stopped for lunch at Tom and Suzie's Diner in Holbrook, AZ, and parked in an area that they had roped off just for Porsches! Victoria had arranged special parking at many of our stops. We had preordered our lunches, and when we entered, waitresses were circling the diner with plates of burgers, sandwiches and

spaghetti. We had our correct lunch before we could sit down, and the food was very good. Victoria does an excellent job of managing the details that make these trips so enjoyable.

It was about 5:00 when we arrived at the Sandia Resort and Casino and were directed to our special parking area in the RV lot. On the shuttle from the lot to the front desk, I met a couple from Colorado Springs who had been in Phoenix watching their granddaughter race junior midgets as part of the IndyCar race weekend at Phoenix International Raceway. They said they were also PCA members and that they knew my Air Force roommate who also races a Porsche. It is a very small Porsche world!


After the long drive, Mark and Karen drove into Albuquerque and found the house that was a filming location in the TV series Breaking Bad. Both of their sons are in television production, and one actually worked as a production assistant on the spin-off series Better Call Saul. They scored big points when they were able to send the boys pictures of the famous house. We relaxed in the bar while waiting for dinner and met Dennis Dorman and his partner Marta, and Brett and KiKi Tiano. The bar was carding everyone, even senior citizens, and Marta and Kiki could not get drinks because Kiki left her ID in the room, and Marta had her expired license which was not accepted! At breakfast the next morning we met Carl and Christine Bloom. Kathy and Christine had a lot of stories to share since they both had been middle school principals.

On Monday we had a short 76 mile drive to Santa Fe. Several people visited the National Museum of Nuclear Science before leaving Albuquerque, and many of our group chose an optional 100 mile twisty adventure up Sandia Crest Road to the Sandia Peak Arial Tramway. We did stop at a gallery in Madrid, a "ghost town" with 200 permanent residents, 35 studios and galleries, and a café that serves a root beer float with homemade root beer and homemade ice cream! The man playing guitar in front of the gallery introduced himself as the owner, artist, designer, and builder of the gallery. He had some beautiful pieces, most of them made by the locals. Kathy found two pieces of garden art that we had shipped home. (Even with a trunk and a frunk, there is not much room in a Spyder, aka the RTB.) Then we saw his "garden." He had four pools of goldfish and koi at different levels. When it was warmer he had pumps that allowed the water

to cascade from the top pond to the others. It was a wonderful setting to display outdoor art and see native plants and flowers.

We checked in to the La Posada de Santa Fe, a motel whose distinctive style is reflected in its name. The town square was just two blocks from the hotel and as soon as we rounded the corner, I experienced déjà vu. In 1959 our family had taken a trip through Durango, Mesa Verde, Santa Fe and then to Cimarron, NM. The Square was exactly as I remembered it. The Native Americans sitting in the shade and selling their handmade jewelry on one side, the Church on another, and the shops and restaurants lining the remaining two sides. We had a great lunch, roamed through the shops, and made it back to La Posada in time for Margarita Monday. Every Monday they have free tequila tasting, explain the different types of tequila, and then make margaritas for everyone. With over 50 people wedged into the bar, the margarita preparation reminded me of the Buena Vista in San Francisco, which has served millions of Irish Coffees. They lined up a string of glasses on the bar and added ingredients in one pour as they moved down the line just as they do in San Francisco. We had a very enjoyable dinner with Cindy and Bruce Wing, Randy and Jane Pidd, and Gisele Gonzalez. Randy was a Head Chef in many hotel restaurants, and had some very interesting insights into the food industry, and it was great to learn of Bruce and Cindy's interesting background.

We left La Posada at 9:30 AM for a 212 mile drive to the historic Strater Hotel in Durango, CO. Mark and Karen Wooldridge had been following us for the last several days to take advantage of our radar detector. This was quite unusual since at the track events he is always in the fastest run group and I am in the slowest! We were doing fine until I got a phone call from work when I was supposed to be navigating and we missed a turn. By the time we corrected course and caught Mark and Karen they were on the side of the road talking to a Colorado Highway Patrolman! I felt horrible until I found out that they had just been given a warning.

That evening we had a group dinner at the Palace Restaurant, a 2-minute walk from the hotel. Mark and Karen and Dennis and Marta were at our table. Dennis and his father were both lawyers in Coronado and his father had been mayor for several terms, so we heard some great stories about the relations with the Navy and the problems with some of the developers. We also were joined by Brett and Kiki, who had been driving the lead car for most of the trip, so it was the first time we had seen them since Scottsdale, and by Al and Karen Bates, who I saw walking every morning but had not had a chance to talk to.

Wednesday we had a full day to explore Durango. Many people drove the Million Dollar Highway to Telluride. This beautiful drive features many curves, steep dropoffs and some areas with no guard rails. You could return on the same highway or take an easier way down and proceed to Mesa Verde National Park to view the ancient Indian cliff dwellings, as most of our group did. I had been to Mesa Verde and Kathy did not want to ride or drive on a winding road, so we left the car in the parking lot all day and rode the Durango to Silverton narrow gauge railroad. We were joined by Carol and Jim Rohan who had been club members for 15 years and were attending their first event. We related well to them since we had been members for 34 years before we began attending events.

The 45 mile railroad was completed in 11 months and opened in 1882, but it took 2 years for the surveyors to find a suitable rail bed through the very steep and rugged terrain. It had to be a narrow gauge because it was impossible for the wider standard gauge to get around the very sharp curves. Once it was completed, trains ran 24 hours a day delivering supplies to miners in Silverton and returning with cars full of silver rich ore for smelting. We rode in the 'Narration Coach,' which features one of the locals playing the part of a historic Durango figure dressed in an authentic costume. Our Narrator was Marshall Robert Dwyer, complete with a Colt .45, who was one of the first homesteaders in the Animas Valley. On the way up he described the history of the railroad, how it was built and the work needed to keep every piece of equipment just the same as it was in the 1880s.

Since there was still snow at the higher elevations, we only went halfway to Silverton. On the return trip Marshall Dwyer told us the story of his life from an illiterate immigrant from Ireland, to a mine worker in Silverton, to a respected rancher. When Durango grew into a lawless frontier town, he was asked to become the Marshall because he knew and had good relations with the miners, ranchers, railroad developers, and the Ute Indians. As the Marshall, he was shot in the face in an altercation with a miner, and suffered horrible pain for four years until he could find a surgeon that could remove the bullet from his neck. As the spellbinding story unfolded, the actor almost broke down as he described the hardships his character had endured. We were so pleased that we had paid for the 'Narrated car' rather than sitting in a similar car and just looking at the scenery. It was like the difference between driving the Million Dollar highway in a Porsche or a Ford Fiesta!

We left Durango early (with Mark and Karen following) for the 157 mile drive to Moab because we had booked a 12:45 jet boat tour up the Colorado River. About an

hour outside of Moab, we received a call that the boat trip had been cancelled due to the high winds that we were experiencing.

Moab is a fantastic adventure town. We had visited Arches National Park and Canyonlands National Park on our first tour and had taken the fantastic Hell's Revenge Hummer off road tour up the Devil's Backbone last year, so we just relaxed while the newbies discovered the awesome experiences of Moab. By now you have probably realized that our 2068 miles, door to door, was probably the lowest of the 23 cars on the trip. High mileage total has to go to Gerrit Osborne who shipped his car from Honolulu and drove the tour with his friend Chuck Hill. He will be going to the Festival of Speed and several other events before he ships his car home and returns himself! The seven people that have done all three tours were joined by Jim and Carol for dinner that night. Kathy and I had a chance to personally thank Javier and Victoria for planning and hosting 3 wonderful events. For the first time all week we had a chance to visit with Mike and Genette McGowan, the other three-tour couple, and we were joined by Iron-woman Gisele.

After a great breakfast at the Gonzo Inn in Moab (where we had stayed the previous 2 years) we started the 344-mile leg to Zion Canyon and Springdale, UT. For the first half of the trip we were actually in the lead pack, four cars behind Brett and Kiki. Highway 70 had a speed limit of 80, and even though there were still some high winds, we made very good time. As we gained altitude it began to snow! It never got worse than light flurries and did not stick to the road so our progress was not affected. I did learn that the RTB needed new windshield wipers. After the lunch stop in Richfield, Mark and I got separated from the group when we made a few extra pit stops. In one small town we pulled into a café parking lot and the café was locked. The farm equipment store across the parking lot was locked as well as the business next to it, so we went behind the building. Then Mark quoted a slight modification of the Jim Croce song, "You don't tug on Superman's cape; you don't spit into the wind; and you don't mess around with Jim."

We entered Zion National Park from the east and stopped several times for photo ops before reaching the Visitor Center at the south entrance of the park. We arrived just as the Visitor Center was closing but had time to talk with a ranger and plan a hike for Saturday morning. The Springhill Suites were just 1.5 miles south of the park entrance. Ten of us had dinner at the Switchback Grill at a huge oval table with high-backed leather chairs. It felt like a board meeting for a large (but very informal) corporation. We sat next to Paul and Shari Beech, who had recently purchased their Macan and were on their first PCA event. Allan

Rosenberg told us the inspiring story of how he was admitted to the USC School of Dentistry even though he had no degree and just 2 years of undergraduate education, and birthday girl, Ann Archibald, described her personal struggle to justify the purchase of her Porsche. At the end of this very enlightening evening, Gisele decided to join Mark, Karen and me on an early morning hike. Kathy's bad knee prevented her from joining us, but we promised to be back by noon so that we would be in Las Vegas by 3:00. That would give her enough time to find a 'loose' Wheel of Fortune slot machine at the Paris casino.

The shuttle bus took us to the park entrance, and then we boarded the park shuttle that travelled up the Canyon and stopped at 9 different trailheads. We took the Kayenta Trail (stop 6) to the Middle Emerald Pool and then followed the lower Emerald Pool Trail to the Zion Lodge shuttle stop. Al and Karen had started earlier on a trail further up the valley and caught up to us as we were reaching the Emerald Pools. They continued on the Upper Pool Trail as we hiked south to the Zion Lodge. We did get back before noon and were soon on our way to Paris!


We stayed in palatial suites in The Palazzo and had our farewell dinner at the Canonita Restaurant on the canals of The Venetian. Tiffanie and Patrick Bodine were at our table along with Victoria, Javier, Ann and Pat Brotman. We also were joined by Porsche of San Diego General Manager Shawn Evans and his girlfriend Roxanne who also works in the auto industry. They were in town for the polo matches that Porsche sponsors and provided some excellent insight into the direction of Porsche and the auto industry in general. The group presented Victoria and Javier with a spa weekend in appreciation for their time and efforts and we found our way (not very easily) back to our suite.

We rose early Sunday morning, and once we found the freeway, were headed home. I could tell Kathy was eager to get home because when it was her turn at the wheel, she was passing cars regularly. Before the trip I had put 2 coats of Protect n' Peel on the RTB's hood and the front valance forward of the headlights. This area was covered with bugs, dirt and even tiny pebbles that had stuck to the coating. I let the car cool in the garage and then easily peeled off the coating along with all of the debris it had collected. The small pebbles came off with the coating and had not even reached the clear bra below. I didn't even have to wash that part of the car!

The plan for next year's tour is California Parks. Expect less driving and more exploring! Registration will open in about 9 months. Hope you will be able to join us!


